

NEW INITIATIVE

FOOTBALL

We continue to give support to our football programme at the school. We appointed a new coach, Mr. Renault Tomlinson. This has resulted in an immediate improvement of the programme. We won at Happy Grove on their home turf for the first time in a decade. In addition to that, we made it to the 2nd round of the Dacosta Cup competition as zone winners also for the 1st time in a decade.

NETBALL

Both Junior and Senior teams participated in the ISSA Urban Area Netball Rally and were crowned champions for the first time. Some of the teams involved were Camperdown, Ardenne, Tarrant High, Wolmers, St. Catherine High, Morant Bay High and Excelsior High.

The ISSA Rural Area competition has since started and so far both our netball teams once again won the first set of games, very convincingly defeating Port Antonio High School, Morant Bay High School (forfeited), Yallahs High School, Seaforth High School and St. Thomas Technical High School. We now have to play all the above teams one more time to end the first round.

TABLE TENNIS

Our Table Tennis teams continue to show signs of good progress under the tutelage of Coach Samuel Lamount. In the Rural leg of the competition last year both the U16 boys and girls teams were crowned champions.

In the All-Island competition, we defeated Kingston College 4-1 in the boys' under 16 competition and in the girls' under 16 competition Titchfield High defeated Campion College 3-1.

I am however tremendously wealthy with what I took from Titchfield, a sterling Secondary Education, exquisitely productive and loving social attitude, I am part of an incomparably powerful societal force for good, which calls me friend and mate; alumni of all ages.
